



About Dormitory Life

International students live in dormitories located on the school premises, just a minute's walk from the school. Meals are provided three times a day in the dining hall attached to the dormitory. Students are responsible for their own housekeeping and laundry, which helps them develop independence. Additionally, the living arrangements are shared with Japanese students, which facilitates the acquisition of the Japanese language. From Monday to Thursday, there is a one-hour study session held from 7pm to 8pm, which helps students develop good study habits.

On weekends, students are free to go out, use the dormitory kitchen to cook, or spend their free time as they wish. If they are interested, they can also participate in various volunteer activities to interact with local community members. During the long breaks in spring, summer, and winter, it is also possible for students to return to their home countries.

Living in the dormitory provides numerous opportunities to experience Japanese culture and acquire the social skills necessary for life in Japan. Furthermore, living together helps students establish a regular routine and strengthens the bonds with their peers.
